1. Summary

This report outlines the outcomes of community and stakeholder engagement as part of a proposal to develop a concept design for a new sports amenities building at Jamieson Park to replace the building that was destroyed by fire late last year. We asked the community for their input on what the design should include so that it meets the needs of the community.

The feedback received will form the basis of a brief for the design consultants to produce concept plans which will be shared with the community in the next stage of consultation on the proposed design.




We received a high level of interest in the project and heard a wide range of suggestions / ideas with the following key themes captured:

- Increased boat / equipment storage
- Multipurpose indoor space (for teaching / meetings / functions / socialising)
- Showers / toilets / changerooms (separate for sports clubs & public)
- Kiosk / café / canteen / kitchen / coffee shop
- Homebase of a sailing club
- Improved access from building to water (currently via carpark)
- Facilities for water sports
- Balcony / veranda for lake views

We also heard feedback suggesting other facilities be included. There were also conflicting comments suggesting that no commercial café and no large development should be considered in the design proposal.




All comments were reviewed and have been themed with a response from Council in Table 1 of the Findings section below. Appendix 1 includes the verbatim community and stakeholder feedback and associated themes.

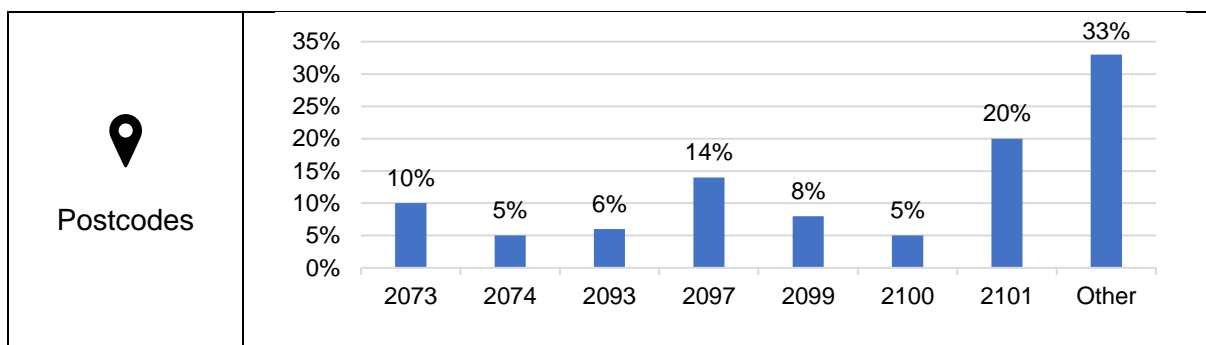

2. Background

The sports amenities building at Jamieson Park was destroyed by fire late last year. A new construction is planned to replace the old building.

The first stage is to develop a concept design for the new space that meets the needs of the community.

We envisage that the building will remain as the home of Narrabeen Lakes Sailing Club with storage and public toilets. There is an opportunity to include other elements in the design and these will be determined through the consultation process.

The feedback received will form the basis of a brief for the design consultants to produce concept plans.

The draft concept plans will be shared with the community in a follow up consultation (Stage 2) on the proposed design.

3. Engagement objectives

Community and stakeholder engagement aimed to:

- build community and stakeholder awareness of participation activities
- provide accessible information so community and stakeholders can participate in a meaningful way
- identify community and stakeholder concerns, local knowledge and values
- provide balanced and objective information to assist the public in understanding the need for the project, how the feedback will be used and what happens next.

4. Engagement approach

Community and stakeholder engagement for the Jamieson Park Sports Amenities Building was conducted between Tuesday 16 August 2022 and Monday 12 September 2022 inclusive, and consisted of a series of activities that provided opportunities for community and stakeholders to contribute.

The engagement was planned, implemented and reported in accordance with Council's [Community Engagement Matrix](#) (2017).

A project page² was established on our Have Your Say platform with information provided in an accessible and easy to read format.

The project was primarily promoted through our regular email newsletter (EDM) channels.

Feedback was captured through an online comment form embedded onto the Have Your Say project page. The form included a question that directly asked respondents what they would like to see on the site and what facilities should be included in the design proposal.

Email and written comments were also invited.

We also held two onsite drop-in sessions so the community could meet the project team and talk to us about what they would like to see included in the new design for the rebuild of the building.

5. Findings

We received a high level of interests in the project and heard a wide range of suggestions / ideas about what the community would like to see on the site. The feedback has been positive with the following key themes captured:

- Increased boat / equipment storage
- Multipurpose indoor space (for teaching / meetings / functions / socialising)
- Showers / toilets / changerooms (separate for sports clubs & public)
- Kiosk / café / canteen / kitchen / coffee shop
- Homebase of a sailing club
- Improved access from building to water (currently via carpark)
- Facilities for water sports
- Balcony / veranda for lake views

In addition to the key themes listed above, we heard other feedback suggesting various facilities be included (e.g. storage space for community groups and hardstand wash down / rigging area). There were also conflicting comments suggesting that no commercial café and no large development should be considered in the design proposal. We also received a number of email submissions sent directly to Council.

All comments were reviewed and captured to form part of the **Table 1**, with verbatim comments shown in **Appendix 1**.

The feedback collected from the community engagement process will be utilised to assist in forming the basis of a brief for the design consultants to produce concept plans that will be shared with the community in the next consultation stage.

Table 1: The key themes and more detailed breakdown of what we heard

Key Theme	What we heard	Council's response
Increased boat / equipment storage	The community felt strongly that the lack of adequate storage space had limited the growth potential of a sailing club and failed to meet the community needs for water sports' storage.	We received many useful and interesting responses from the community about what they would like to see on the site and we will collate all key themes captured as a list of preferred facilities / amenities to be included in the design. The list will form part of the design brief for the architect to prepare draft concept plans for the next stage of community consultation. The facilities or amenities to be included in the final design will be subject to further community consultation, stakeholder feedback, project funding availability, and planning, environmental and design constraints.
Multipurpose indoor space (for teaching / meetings / functions / socialising)	Most respondents suggested that a multipurpose indoor space should be included for different reasons including teaching / meetings / functions / social events / shelter for bad weather. The space could be fully utilised by the community sports clubs during their seasons and to hire out to the general public for use out of hours.	
Showers / toilets / changerooms (separate for sports clubs & public)	The community would like to see improved amenities including showers / toilets / changerooms provided and would prefer separate access for community sports clubs and the general public due to security and hygiene concerns.	
Kiosk / café / canteen / kitchen / coffee shop	Feedback indicated that people would like to see the inclusion of a kiosk / café / coffee shop offering coffee or food; while the sailing community suggested a kitchen or canteen be included to meet the catering needs of events / functions of sports clubs.	
Homebase of a sailing club	The sailing community strongly expressed their interest in remaining a presence on the site.	
Improved access from building to water (currently via carpark)	Safety concerns were raised over the access arrangement from the old sports amenities building to the water (currently via the carpark) and the community felt that improved access should be considered.	
Facilities for water sports	The community considered that Jamieson Park was not only a perfect spot for sailing, but also for other water sports such as kayaking, canoeing, stand-up paddling, dragon boats and model yachts etc. The proposed new sports amenities building should consider facilities that would support and meet these needs.	

Balcony / veranda for lake views	Some people suggested the provision of balcony / veranda in the design proposal for their enjoyment of the beautiful lake views, with the building being two storeys.

In addition Whitworths has donated 8 Opti training dinghies and other clubs such as Concord Ryde SC, Northbridge SC and Lane Cove SC as well as many individuals have donated Opti and Sabot dinghies, bringing the club's fleet for juniors to around 18 dinghies. These together with three power boats are now stored in shipping containers provided by Council. As a result, the Club can open its sailing season, with enthusiasm but under less than ideal conditions. Most dinghy clubs are two story, with the ground floor dedicated to secure exclusive storage of the club's dinghies, rescue and Committee boats, VHF radios and a range of other necessary and valuable equipment. 106	<p><i>"My Name is [REDACTED] My Father was the Narrabeen Lake Sailing Club (NLSC) Commodore in the 1970's , and consulted with Warringah Shire Council, when the council originally agreed to provide facilities to help the club. I spent my formative years with the club as a teenager, from late 1960's to late 1970's. My parents, being very active on the NLSC committee, while my sailing skills improved, eventually becoming NLSC Club Champion twice, National and State junior champion, and placed in open divisions of both. Several past members of NLSC, that grew up on this lake, have had distinguished careers in sailing, prominent international sailmakers and yachtsmen, some Olympic representation and even crewing on America's Cup contenders for Australia, and club hosting regular membership from all over the wider Sydney area to the Blue mountains, as well as hosting National and State championships of several classes of sport dinghys. For such a small club, it had, and still has an impressive reputation in the sailing community. The fact that council owns all the land surrounding the lake, (where it is deep enough to sail) has always unfortunately, limited the size of the club and available club assets. Unfortunately, the Narrabeen facility, even though hard fought for, ranked very low and basic functionality, on the national stage of sailing clubs. These most often, totally provided by outside sources (such as council funding and grants) then the financial membership of the club itself. As you would be aware by now, NLSC is a VERY old club, dating back to pre-war days, with a significant and continuous community following, (since the post war re-emergence around 1946) a 'not for profit' club, that holds family and community values above "high membership fees", which helps keep the community engaged in lake based activities. My Father... was one of the original instigators of the "building committee", in the 1970s, eventually convincing council of the need for a facility to service the NLSC at Jamison Park, not just a toilet block, but a place where community, not just the club, could focus. (negotiations with Council started mid '70's I believe) Indeed, there were concessions for the club, for some storage and lake rescue boat / facilities, along with some club based items, but unfortunately, there were limited club facilities, compared to other sailing clubs and different sporting facilities, such as a communal utility / hall, for meetings and gatherings, presentations and community events, members only toilets, viewing platforms, verandas etc, offices for committee staff, full kitchen for food preparation and sales of refreshments for competitors and community... All which were initially on the table in the 1960's and 70's, but ultimately rejected by the council, mainly due to the greater community information shortfall. (A 'for profit' business based on community interest in watersports) It seems that although the kayak hire business, was ultimately successful (and no slight to that operation is intended) but oversights that were deemed illegal, were perhaps ignored, due to public overwhelming support for a café/ food business - which I believe was installed illegally from that venue and (speaking from an electrical contractor point of view, may have actually overloaded available electricity capabilities of the building) No, land based or water based sports storage facilities, or other community storage, including no further facilities for the club as promised, that I could find, were apparently even considered.</i></p> <p><i>A short story if I may; In the early 1970's Manly Warringah Council, had not been convinced that the NLSC sailing club was a community based service and had delayed and quashed previous efforts for the club to have any permanent presence on the lake. His successor/s, took it much further and had several "club boats" for community use to "find out" what sailing is all about. Jamison Park, once a somewhat forgotten part of the northern beaches, is now a thriving and social community area, where once a desolate sandy (often muddy) reclaimed by-product beach, where a large, old canvas, ex army marquee tent, was raised each weekend, with a welcoming cuppa beckoning (for everyone who wanted some refreshment, member or not) and base for the NLSC club, went to a rich and welcoming facility for the club and community, resided - until recently. A place where newcomers are welcome, even a lift "off the roof racks" for a total stranger, a place where values are retained and community spirit thrives... Other sports, once associated with the lake, have now withdrawn, mainly due to the total lack of facilities. Even the National Fitness Centre at the western end of the lake, the watersports were withdrawn, due to land issues at the western end - (where I used to be a sailing instructor) Rowing, canoeing and other water-based activities, could not get a large enough base, or enough storage. This would be a golden opportunity to promote NLSC as a manager club, for such community based interests, if there were sufficient improvement to the new facility. The Belmont 16 foot skiff club on Lake Macquarie, is one of Australia's largest and finest sailing clubs, boasting thousands of associate members, as well as hundreds of active boating members. It was at 1 point, a council owned facility, serving the greater community. On a sailing level, NLSC can compete at the highest levels standards and while I am not suggesting anything close to a multimillion dollar complex, a club facility, which genuinely caters to the community, needs a little more than some storage and change rooms In my opinion, particularly as council promised an upgrade to facilities, some nearly 50 years ago...Perhaps now is time to explore a facility that reflects those values, one that serves the community, like other similar sailing clubs across the country, with perhaps those extra facilities, a kitchen with shop, (I believe the club canteen started to do this at one point) perhaps other facilities and appropriate grounds as well. Even after the fire, the community has shown their support and "given back", where many people in the community donated, sponsorship of some replacement club boats and the repairs or replacements of equipment.</p> <p>Will the N B Council consider its Predecessors 1970's commitment and re-look at the expansion plans and promises, with the greater community in mind, just like the club has always done? There was at one point, a proposal to share NLSC facilities with the community, I am sure there could be a NLSC manager appointed to voluntarily oversee community access if facilities were appropriately expanded. I am sure there will be lots of suggestions, by current members and NLSC committee members, but I think the one thing that rises above all else, is that NLSC, has never detracted from its community based roots, and still needs as much ongoing support as possible based on community outcomes. 	<p><i>On the 27th of November 2021 at 5.15 pm the Narrabeen sailing club tragically caught fire and was destroyed. Me and my wife live directly opposite Jamieson Park at 36 The Esplanade, Narrabeen and I was one of the first to attend the scene and call the fire brigade that afternoon. Photo below showing the owner of the kayak hire centre trying to save her stock. Images below showing the kayak hire shop on a typical summer weekend day at Jamieson Park. The hire centre initially started as low key operation and slowly grew over the years into something that dominated the park usage. As you can see the facility was bursting at the seams with kayaks, bike hire and stand-up paddle board spread across the park. The facility was also being used as a makeshift café/ice cream shop, ebike hire, kayak sales centre. The tenants of the hire centre also build many unapproved makeshift structures at the back of the premises to house the kayaks and the like. They also did unauthorised building works on the council building. This hire centre attracted a large number of locals and visitors to the park stretching the parks resources to breaking point. With vehicles constantly driving on the parks grass causing erosion within the park, damage to trees, fencing to within parking area. The Tenant would also have backpackers staying in the centres at different time of the year.</i></p> <p><i>The parks resources also get stretched and damage with other watercraft and there trailer, dragon boats being left long term in the park almost left to rot. The Narrabeen sailing club is a fantastic facility for the Northern Beaches community. See images below of a typical summer weekend for the sailing club at adjected to the club. Please see below imagers from my property of the typical warmer month weekend of visitors to the park. Car parking often reaches is maximum compacity by 9-10 am in the warmer months on the weekends, with high traffic volumes and parking demands are high with the over following onto and along the Esplanade during the warmer months. Image below shows a typical warmer month with a large number of visitor's number enjoying the parks facilities. We do often unfortunately get park visitors having parties staying until late into the evening playing loud music and consuming alcohol, this results in the residents calling the police several times a year to move them on.</i></p> <p><i>We also get several campers stay in the park for many months at a time and a few of them stay all year-round, urinating in the park and leaving rubbish, plastic bottles and even campfires behind. But the very next week, the families and sailors joined us as they did every weekend to enjoy the lake, the social community, participate in the sport and demonstrate that the club would return stronger than ever. The heart of this club is in its people and the connectedness that is generated by the weekly attraction of sport, learning new things and making new friends. Therefore, any building considerations MUST preserve and protect the future and legacy of this sailing club. The club welcomes the opportunity to create a space that is built for the community and that can have multiple uses to benefit more people throughout the week, while it ensures the sailing club can continue to offer the services it always has and to be viable into the future. On Sunday (07/08/22) we had to balance one of the heavy boat trailers on its side so we could assess the Dragon Boats, still with difficulties and a danger to us. The club has no facilities nor storage for the long-standing club at Jamison Park. At my age (71y) it is too dangerous to access the area where the Dragon Boats have been allocated to.
